NMI's Role in the Meat Industry

NMI ensures accuracy and fairness in trade transactions by:

- Inspecting measuring instruments used for trade
- Licensing organisations involved in the service & repair of measuring instruments
- Checking measurement declarations (e.g. Prepacks, invoices, advertising) are correct
- Investigating complaints and providing information
- Taking enforcement action where necessary

- Current regulatory requirements for Sale of Meat

Meat that must be Sold by Weight


Examples – Beef, Chicken, Sheep, Fish (not shellfish), Pig, Kangaroo, Deer

Meat	Not Meat
Crumbing	Blending (e.g. sausages)
Curing	Combining (e.g. Kebab on stick)
Glazing	Fermenting (e.g. salami)
Marinading	Filling (e.g. Kiev)
Slicing	Reconstituting/Forming (e.g. chicken nuggets)
Smoking	Stuffing



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Weighing Equipment



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Weighing Equipment

Must be trade approved and verified



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The Measurement Process

Traders must ensure that either:

 The measuring process and scale indications are visible to customer

OR

 The purchaser is given a written statement of the weight at the time the product is supplied



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The Measurement Process

All articles sold by weight must be net weight Allowance must be made for:

- **Plastic bags**
- **Trays**
- **Glad wrap**
- Cryovacs
- **Soaker Pads**



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Pre-packing and Labelling Meat

What is the definition of prepack?

- Product and packaging prepared before being offered for sale
- Completely or partially enclosed by packaging material and cannot be altered without opening the packaging
- It has a pre-determined value

Prepackaged Meat is required to be marked in compliance with the prepacked articles requirements

Prepackages must be marked with a net weight

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Pre-packing and Labelling Meat

Must be marked with a measurement on the principal display panel. If prepackages are 'random' weight must also be marked with the:

- Unit Price and
- Total price



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Bulk Sales and Off Cuts

Bulk Sales:

When making up orders for restaurants, hotels where the purchaser is not present a written statement of measurement must be given at the time of delivery.

Off Cuts:

If the customer requests a piece of meat trimmed they should be offered the trimmings

All advertising must be price per kilogram

What is the Measurement Law Review?

Comprehensive review of Australia's measurement laws

- National Measurement Act 1960
- National Measurement Regulations 1999
- National Trade Measurement Regulations 2009

Aims:

- remove unnecessary regulatory burden
- consolidate the legislative framework
- move towards a more principles-based framework

Definition of meat - meat of dead animals

- Regulation 1.5 of the National Trade
 Measurement Regulations 2009
- Definition over 3 pages lists animals and processes.
- Defines what meat <u>must</u> be sold by mass.

Is there a better way?



Review of measurement labelling for prepackages

- Review of measurement labelling for prepackages.
- Considering reducing prescription around size, orientation, location, etc of measurement mark.

Shortfall and weighing instruments

- Instruments used for trade must be pattern approved and verified.
- Principle of shortfall consumers get what they pay for.
- How do we best achieve this?
 - Compliant instruments producing prepackages?
 - Auditing of prepackages?
